Resurrection and Rebirth

Easter comes a bit late this year, on the third Sunday in April. We have a few weeks to go before we get there. We will have a wonderful service of celebration on Easter Sunday, of course, and an Easter egg hunt for the children after the service! But before we get to Easter, we pass through Holy Week. We will have meaningful services, starting on Palm Sunday with our triumphant Palm Parade to celebrate Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. There will be a very special guest on Palm Sunday during the children's sermon – parents, be sure to bring the kids so they don't miss our guest!

Our Maundy Thursday service will be called Stations of Peter, and will include candlelight and communion. Our Good Friday service will feature a beautiful choir cantata. Each year I encourage folks to attend Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services as well as Easter Sunday. Holy Week is a journey, and we can't really experience the Resurrection without experiencing first the Cross. Death always comes before Resurrection.

Years ago, in 2012 and 2013, I had my own personal holy week experiences. In 2012, in the week prior to Holy Week, my mother died. She had an emergency surgery and her recovery appeared to be progressing, but then for a number of reasons her health began to decline. Her funeral was on the Friday prior to Palm Sunday. In 2013, in the week prior to Holy Week, I received a call from the Cedar Rapids police department, notifying me that my father had died. My father's death was completely unexpected. His funeral was also on the Friday prior to Palm Sunday. Holy Week for me in those two years was a combination of rushing to prepare for the worship services and trying to process what almost seemed like a dream.

The miracle of Easter is that God always has the last word. We rejoice at new beginnings, and it is our hope that

sustains us. But the death part is hard – whether it is the death of a dream, or a job, or a season of our lives, or life itself. I think in our world of pharmaceuticals, therapy and cosmetic surgery, we have come to believe (or at least to wish) that we can avoid suffering and the unwanted transitions that are a normal part of life. But then something unexpected and tragic happens. Or maybe we just look in the mirror and – yikes! – there is another wrinkle or another grey hair. Or maybe the grey has completely taken over. I don't think most of us feel (at least mentally) as old as we are, and that reflection in the mirror occasionally catches us off guard. Life's heartbreaks catch us off guard as well.

Easter is our reminder that after winter comes spring. The peonies will bloom, the buds will appear on the trees – everything will spring back to life after the cold dormant winter. It is a resurrection of creation in harmony with the resurrection of Christ that we will be celebrating come Easter Sunday.

Holy Trinity is also in the midst of rebirth. Not that we have ever been dead! This church has remained strong and vibrant and faithful through many transitions, some difficult and some joyful: A congregational division long ago, a denominational division not so long ago, a pandemic, commitments to inclusivity and new ministries, and pastoral transitions, including this new pastor's arrival last July. As individuals and as a congregation, we are continually called to grow and change.

Christ's resurrection is the event that paves the way for our journey. The Christian faith does not just look back to a great teacher and example, but forward to where Christ leads. Jesus calls us to follow him on a path that is overflowing with possibility and purpose. As we move forward, we will continue to build on the strength and tradition of our past. I feel so blessed to be in ministry with you. Put on your shades – the future is bright!



Inclusion Starts with I by Carol Ottoson

My latest mantra is actually the mantra that the I Team has been embracing since we became a Reconciling Congregation -- "Lead with Love." Lead with love – in every action that you do, think about the love behind that action. We finished our Love Your Neighbor campaign at the end of March with a Tower of Love competition using our donations to the CAP Agency's food shelf. Our goal with this whole campaign has been to encourage all of us to step out of our comfort zone and do more with advocacy, education, and service to others. The purpose has been to be intentional in sharing our love for others. Even though the campaign is "over," I certainly hope that your intentional "leading with love" actions continue throughout your lives. There is so much division and vitriol out there that some days it becomes very hard to heed Jesus' call to love all, including our enemies. I have to admit I had some remarkable experiences happen to me (and my family) since the beginning of this campaign, and I'm even more determined to be what I am calling the "best version of myself" as I move forward. As we move into our second quarter (April-June) – Do Unto Others – I hope that you will live Jesus' words in Matthew 7:12, "So in everything, do to others what you would have them do to you, for this sums up the Law and the Prophets." I will continue to stand up for immigrants, for the LBGTQ+ community, especially my trans friends, for people who are being bullied, for people who are living in domestic violence situations, for all of the lost and all of the least. Jesus has taught us well, and as Christians we have a mandate to live out his teachings.

As we move through Lent and into Easter this year, our lives should be informed, as well as transformed, by the lessons Jesus taught us, both in how he lived his life and how he faced his death. Jesus' love and acceptance of others knows no bounds. He is very clear in the importance of loving all: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: Love your neighbor as yourself." (Matthew 22:37-39). In other words Jesus commands us to "Lead with Love." Happy Spring, Happy Easter, and remember, *Inclusion starts with I.*

Unexpected Lessons

Yesterday it was my turn to lead in Kids' Church. We had a fifth grader, two first graders, three preschoolers and a toddler. Luckily, we also had two youth and a bonus adult helper, because as you can imagine, with an age spread like that, leading in any meaningful way can be a challenge. Our measure of success is that kids leave knowing they are loved. But, if the kids are restless and you feel frazzled, it can be REALLY hard to get that "show them they are loved" thing across. When I was a parent of kids these ages, I was frazzled all the time. And I felt like I was failing all the time. The differences between me as a young parent, and me as a seasoned leader in Kids' Church are numerous, not the least that yesterday I had helpers who were available and excellent. However two particular differences are key to what makes me effective as a Kids' leader and in general have improved me as a human being.

The first key difference is confidence; as a young parent, I struggled with confidence in myself, and confidence in God's work in our family life. I was pretty sure it was all up to me and I was wrecking my kids chances of growing into kind people who could think critically and apply effort toward having fulfilling lives and making the world a better place (my own parent goals.) I knew Jesus taught we were loved and welcomed as we were, but back then I was too absorbed in trying to "get it right" and too focused on all the ways I was getting it wrong. The real turnaround happened when I began testing the promise that God would be with me in uncertainty. When I stopped trying to manage everything into a controllable state and just started showing up at Parent Teacher conferences trusting that God had it in hand and would help us, the tension I brought into our relationships reduced, and the outcomes pretty much stayed the same. I now know firsthand that when we choose to have confidence in our belovedness we start to be liberated from fearing judgement and from judging ourselves. This confidence open us up to gratitude toward God, and a desire to know more about what Jesus taught.

The second key difference between me then and now is joy. All that fear of getting it wrong, plus the daily overwhelm that is a hallmark of parenting small kids took far too much of the joy of those early years out of me. I have many beautiful memories of that time, but when I think of joy as a parent the first thing I think of is the relief I felt when everyone was finally in bed and we'd survived another day. That isn't terrible, it is far better than hopelessness or anger that things aren't going better (which are also feelings I have experienced), but relief isn't the abundant life God promises us through Jesus. Joy results first from trusting that God's power is immense and that God's plan is at work always, even when our own plans aren't going well, even when things seem extraordinarily bad. Trusting God empowers us to do the things Jesus tells us to do, for example, seeking God's will (trusting God with our lives), forgiving those who have wronged us (trusting God with our hurt), and loving others when they are hard to love (trusting that despite appearances they are another beloved child of God). From this comes even greater joy.

On Sunday morning, confidence and joy transformed a Bible story, some watercolor paints, glue, tissue paper, stickers and a handful of uncertain and restless kids from a potential mess into a celebration. Sure, some of those kids may have gone home thinking the story was about the First Lunch instead of the Last Supper, and the words "Remember me" may not be remembered, but I know that the joy and confidence breathed into the lesson and into the sharing of craft supplies made an impact on them. Furthermore, I believe that reminding them they are loved by Jesus and by their church planted seeds within them that will grow.

Even though the curriculum we use might not list out the following as learning objectives, these are absolutely lessons we can take from Kids' Church just about any week we meet:

- Trust God and let go of the desire to control and manage the unmanageable.
- Seek God first and the rest will come.
- Lean on your helpers and then support and encourage them, too.
- Nurture and nourish the seeds of joy and confidence that have been planted in you, by God and by your church community, and then share them with the world!

April Mission of the Month

They are a prevention and solutions-focused organization partnering with law enforcement, county legal systems, social services and healthcare providers to make the communities of Scott and Carver counties a better, safer place to live. Their journey continues as they support and empower victims, survivors and their families, and create awareness to **End Domestic Violence** in our communities.

Today, SVA continues to be the only nonprofit domestic violence agency located in Scott and Carver counties. Since its founding, the organization has assisted more than 24,000 women, men and children as they try to live healthy, violence-free lives.

SERVING THOSE IN NEED

Last year, SVA served 1,118 victim- survivors with our programs and services. Core programs include a 24/7 phone line and crisis intervention, support groups, court advocacy, transitional housing, and community education.

CRISIS INTERVENTION

Victim-survivors call us in their time of greatest need. 2,251 calls to our crisis line were answered by trained staff and volunteer advocates. This line can also be utilized by concerned family and friends that may have questions.

MOVE TO SHAKOPEE

SVA moved into the new Domestic Abuse Advocacy Center located in downtown Shakopee. This convenient location is close to public transportation, county services and community partners.

EDUCATING OUR COMMUNITY

SVA provides community outreach and education to teach about domestic violence and healthy relationships. Last year, 2,566 adults and youth attended a training session.



Inspired by the true World War II history of the few bookshops to survive the Blitz, <u>The Last</u> <u>Bookshop in London</u> is a timeless story of wartime loss, love and the enduring power of literature.



Holy Trinity is looking for volunteers to join us on our mission trip to Costa Rica Dec 27, 2025-Jan 3, 2026. Our team will be returning to Grecia where we will once again be partnering with Strong Missions to help this impoverished community with a variety of projects. On past trips, we have completed major home renovations for single moms, worked on a school addition, helped build a church & orphanage, taught Vacation Bible school, delivered food to low income families and made infrastructure improvements to the Mission grounds and a precario.

The trip is expected to cost ~\$950 for your food, lodging and transportation to and from the Liberia airport plus the cost of your flight from MSP. You can cover some of these expenses by helping with the four remaining fundraisers that we have scheduled prior to the trip.

On July 11th & 12th you can help park cars on the church grounds during Lakefront Music Fest. You can also volunteer to work at the event which will let you attend the event while also earning money for the trip. In the fall you can raise funds by volunteering to run the meat raffle at Country Primetime on Thursday evenings and by helping with a silent auction at church.
