A note for the times we live in

Our faith teaches us that every human being is created in the image of God and worthy of dignity, safety, justice, and love. So many people in our congregation and community have been living with heightened fear and uncertainty because of the immigration enforcement actions taking place around us. Between the alarming news stories and videos, the endless adaptation required in accomplishing our mission work, and the ever-increasing need of those who are truly trapped inside their homes – the emotional toll is exhausting. As your pastor, I want you to hear this clearly: you are not alone.

To all who are living with fear and anxiety: this church stands with you. Your lives matter. Your stories matter. Your presence among us is a blessing. If you need prayer, practical support, or just someone to listen, please reach out. Together, we will do our best to walk with you.

To those who are wondering how to respond: Check in on your neighbors. Read and listen to a variety of news sources. Learn about the realities facing immigrant families in our community. Come to Hope Café and learn more about our efforts to feed families in need in this turbulent time. Pray – not only with your words, but with your kindness and loving actions.

Lenten Soup Suppers and Movie Study




Please join us this Lent for a simple soup supper followed by a movie study on *The Way*.



January-March 2026 Mission Focus

-Food Insecurity-



Holy Trinity has started quarterly missions to coordinate with the quarterly I-Team focus, rather than having separate missions each month. The mission focus for the first quarter (January-March) is *Food Insecurity* which coordinates with the I-Team focus of *Love Your Neighbor*. **We will be collecting both perishable and nonperishable food donations for Hope Pantry as well as monetary donations for the CAP Agency's Food Shelf and for R.O.C.K.** The CAP agency is able to pool monetary donations so they can buy food items in bulk at a lower unit cost. For each \$1 donated, they are able to purchase approximately \$6 worth of food. Rock serves children at all schools in the Prior Lake area and now at Kenwood Middle School in Lakeville. Rock provides Power Packs, which are sent home with students in backpacks that include: 2 breakfasts, 2 lunches, 2 snacks, a fruit and a vegetable. They offer their Power Pack Program to all families who feel they could benefit from these food items.

Here are some most needed items for Hope Pantry, but all donations are welcome.

Inclusion Starts with I by Carol Ottoson...

My favorite Bible verse of all time is Matthew 22:37-39 *“Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment.” And the second is like it: “Love your neighbor as yourself.”* In fact, we are now in the middle of the I Team’s *Love Your Neighbor* campaign. Now is the time to love our neighbors more than ever, especially after the travesties and tragedies of January.

This, of course, leads to the question, “Who are our neighbors?” I will go back to Jesus’ words in Matthew 25:40, “Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.” Our neighbors are immigrants; they are members of the LGBTQ+ community; they are people of every color, of every background, and of every socio-economic status.

Now more than ever, we need to step up for our neighbors in any way that we can. For some of us it is volunteering, for others it is participating in resistance, for yet others it is contributing money to good causes. To ignore what is currently happening to our neighbors, especially our immigrant and BIPOC neighbors, is not an option. The fear is real, and the stakes are high. I have a friend who has an adopted Korean daughter who is now in her late thirties. Her daughter lives in constant fear that she will be targeted when she is out in the community, even though she’s been an American citizen since she was an infant.


I have another friend who is an English teacher at Shakopee High School. Toward the end of January, she described the morning two senior girls who walked into her room, one was shaking. Why? ICE stopped her on her way to school to ask for her passport, not her driver's license. She wasn't speeding, she didn't have a light out, BUT she's brown and they asked her where she was born! This is horrendous! A 17-year-old girl who was stopped on her way to school because of the color of her skin. A 17-year-old girl who was expected to be driving with a passport. A 17-year-old girl who was terrified that she was going to be taken away for doing absolutely nothing wrong. What if she were your daughter?

My heart cries every time I think about what is happening to our children. Some are frightened for themselves or members of their family; others are frightened for their friends. Some are so angry and frustrated that they’re not sure how to feel except extremely helpless and hopeless. Kids and toddlers being sent to detention centers in Texas is a reality; children being separated from their parents at a traffic stop is a reality; children coming home to empty houses because their parents have been deported is a reality, even in our own community.

We know that many families in Scott County are too afraid to leave their homes, and they are running out of food to feed their families. I personally know a teacher who delivers food and supplies to families of her students nearly every day after school on her own time, even though she has a family of her own. We’ve had social workers, nurses, county employees, teachers, and others coming to the Hope Café and Pantry to deliver food to people who are afraid to leave their homes. We are trying to do all that we can to reach other families who need food and supplies. This should not be happening in our country, but it is! As followers of Christ it is our duty – no, it is our mandate – to do what we can to help our neighbors.

I had a conversation with an immigrant shortly after the death of Alex Pretti. He had seen the outpouring of thousands of people in support of their neighbors on January 23rd, and he had seen what had happened to Renae Good less than three weeks earlier. He is afraid for himself and for his family, even though he is here legally. In tears he told me that he couldn’t believe that people would literally risk their lives to help him and others like him. He almost felt guilty about it. I told him that we are called by Jesus to love our neighbors and to do what we can to show that love. John Wesley said it beautifully, “Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can.” Remember, Inclusion starts with I.
